
Sermon Notes



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God Is Faithful

Introduction

- 1. Faithfulness is a quality or attribute applied in the Scriptures to God—it is a constant theme in the Bible.
- 2. Faithfulness is dependability, loyalty and stability.
 - a. All of these describe God in His relationship to man.
 - b. God is "the faithful God who keeps His covenant." (Deut. 7:9)
 - c. "Great is Your faithfulness." (Lam. 3:23)
- 3. In this lesson, we are going to consider the faithfulness of God by:
 - a. Establishing the reality of His faithfulness.
 - b. Presenting evidence for His faithfulness.
 - c. Seeing how God's faithfulness affects us today.

I. The Reality of the Faithfulness of God

- A. The Scriptures contain many references to the faithfulness of God.
- B. The psalmist and the prophets repeatedly cited God's faithfulness. (Psa. 36:5; 37:3; 89:1-2; 92:1-2; 119:90; Lam. 3:22-23; Isa. 49:7; Hos. 11:12)

II. Evidence for the Faithfulness of God

- A. It is one thing to claim that God is faithful but it is an entirely different matter to prove it.
 - 1. One may claim to be something when he is nothing. (Gal. 6:3)
 - 2. One sure way to prove His faithfulness is to consider His dependability when it comes to the covenants He has made with man.
- B. Considering several of the covenants God has made with man which will not only illustrate but also provide testimony to the fact that God is faithful.
- C. The covenant with Noah.
 - 1. God made a covenant with Noah assuring him that He would never again destroy the world by flood. (Gen. 9:11)
 - 2. God established that covenant and, in His faithfulness, has upheld the promise He made in it. (Gen. 9:14-17)
- D. The covenant with Abraham.
 - 1. God promised to bless Abraham's descendants and make them His special people.
 - 2. God reaffirmed His promise to Abraham in Genesis 15.
 - 3. God remained true to His word and fulfilled every promise in this covenant He had made with Abraham. (Psa. 105:8-12)
 - 4. God's faithfulness to this covenant continued to its ultimate conclusion in the seed of Abraham, Jesus Christ. (Gal. 3:16)

- E. The covenant with Israel.
 - 1. While the children of Israel were encamped at Mount Sinai, God promised to make a covenant with them. (Ex. 19:3-6)
 - 2. Though Israel time and again failed to honor God's covenant, God continued to faithfully uphold and respect it. (Psa. 106:44-45; 111:5; Rom. 3:3-4)
- F. The covenant with David.
 - 1. In this covenant David and his descendants were established as the royal heirs to the throne of Israel. (2 Sam. 7:12-16)
 - 2. In spite of the sins of David's descendants, God kept His covenant He had made with him. (2 Chron. 21:7)
 - 3. This covenant reached its highest fulfillment when Jesus was born in Bethlehem about a thousand years after the promise of God.
 - 4. Peter said that Jesus was a fulfillment of the promise to David. (Acts 2:29-36)
- G. That God has always kept His covenants is evidence of His abiding faithfulness. (Dan. 9:4; Neh. 1:5)

III. How the Faithfulness of God Affects Us Today

- A. God promised He would make a new covenant with all mankind. (Jer. 31:31-34)
- B. The death of Jesus on the cross ushered in the new covenant.
- C. Since God has been shown to keep His covenants, His faithfulness is a characteristic of the everlasting new covenant.
- D. Several blessings are given to His children because of God's faithfulness.
 - 1. God's faithfulness, as well as His righteousness, is manifested in the forgiveness of sin. (1 John 1:9)
 - 2. God's faithfulness is the assurance of salvation. (Heb. 10:23)
 - 3. God's faithfulness is the source of deliverance from temptation. (1 Cor. 10:13)
- E. God is faithful to His children because He is first of all faithful to Himself. (2 Tim. 2:13)
- F. This attribute of faithfulness is also ascribed to Jesus in the New Testament.
 - 1. He is called a "faithful High Priest." (Heb. 2:17)
 - 2. In Revelation He is called "the faithful witness" and the "Faithful and True." (Rev. 1:3, 3:14; 19:11)

Conclusion

- "It should never be forgotten that, according to the Scripture, God is faithful in such an absolute sense as to contrast Him with men who are faithful only in a relative sense, and who appear as changeable and faithless in comparison with the faithfulness of God." (*International Standard Bible Encyclopaedia*)
- 2. Because God is faithful, we can place complete trust in Him knowing that what He has promised He will fulfill. (Prov. 3:5-6)
